The Advertisement for Bids was published in the Washington Daily News and the Greater Diversity News, in addition to direct solicitation to area contractors and plan rooms. Thirteen (13) sets of specifications were distributed to the City, the funding agency, plan rooms and contractors. Bids were received from three (3) contractors for the project as follows:

Frankie Buck explained the project and grant application was initiated in 2015. Councilmember Mercer asked if we could rename the project to reflect 2017. Mr. Buck will verify with the funding agency to determine if the project name can be changed. {Follow-up: Division of Water Infrastructure will need to keep the project title as 2015 Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation.}

By motion of Councilmember Mercer, seconded by Councilmember Beeman, Council issued tentative award for Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation 2015 Project to Insituform Technologies, LLC (AEGION Corporation) for the bid amount of \$1,287,348.80. Final award of the project should be subject to Division of Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Funding Approval and Contractor's Safety Evaluation.

By motion of Councilmember Mercer, seconded by Councilmember Brooks, Council adopted the associated resolution as presented.

Councilmember Beeman noted the Electric Advisory (WEUAB) met last week and voted to start meeting on a monthly basis. Councilmember Mercer noted the WEUAB would like direction from Council for specific items Council wants them to address, such as electric rates (adjustments) and electric transfer policy (updated in 2004).

Council, by consensus authorized the WEUAB to move forward and address the aforementioned items. Council also gave WEUAB the latitude to recommend items of concern/interest to Council.
